

Health Commissioner's Message...

The Board of Health, staff and I want to thank the voters of Greene County for supporting our November 2010 levy. Over 54% of voters said yes to our levy request, which is outstanding support in a recovering economy. The Board's message resonated with the public: the Greene County Combined Health District (GCCHD) is asking for just enough money to keep current services, and to maintain the outstanding quality of services that residents have come to expect.

When we examined the successful passage of the levy, we looked at the reason for the public's support. In 2010, we were rated in the top ten overall among all Health Districts in Ohio by the Robert Woods

Johnson Foundation and the University of Wisconsin's national rating of all Health Districts in the United States. That same rating listed us as #1 in clinical care. According to the Ohio Department of Health (ODH), we spent less per capita in 2009 than any other Health District in Ohio for our population size and range of services (and even after the levy's passage, we still spend less!). The Health District has only asked for levy increases twice in 56 years, which is remarkable for a service agency (and still kept the request under one mill). Finally, in looking at the Health District's budget, the public realized that 87% of our budget goes for services that benefit County residents.

2010 saw two additional recognitions for GCCHD excellence. In April 2010, the Office of the Civilian Volunteer Medical Reserve Corps recognized the Greene County Medical Reserve Corps for its outstanding service to the community during the 2009 H1N1 influenza pandemic. In addition, Ohio Senator Chris Widener recognized the efforts of the Health District in vaccinating/coordinating over 32,000 people. In June of 2010, ODH announced that Greene County had achieved a childhood vaccination rate of over 90% for children three years and younger. The average for the state of Ohio is 81.8%.

Because of your support, we will be able to continue to provide the best possible services to you, our customers. We look forward to working with our community partners toward protecting your health, preventing illness and injury and promoting health and wellness for everyone in Greene County.

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Our Mission

It is the mission of the Greene County Combined Health District (GCCHD) to protect, promote and improve the health of Greene County residents. The GCCHD will ensure, through an organized community effort:

- A clean and healthy environment,
- The provision of quality medical services,
- The control of communicable diseases,
- Healthier-lifestyle education,
- Preventive health programs, and
- Ongoing community health assessments and the implementation of a strategic plan to address identified needs.



In Memoriam ~ Elaine K. Straley ~ 1942-2010



In 2010, Board of Health member Elaine K. Straley passed away. The Board lost a friend, mentor and role model. Elaine was a woman of many interests: she retired from the Greene County Career Center after 17 years as a Culinary Arts Instructor; she was a Home Economics teacher at Cedarville High School for 10 years; she helped found the Silver Spoons 4-H Club; and was a member of the Mother Goose Club. Elaine was the first female President of the OSU Extension Advisory Committee. Elaine was also an active member of the Ohio Restaurant Association Education Foundation. She was inducted into the Greene County Women's Hall of Fame. She attended the Ohio State University and graduated from Central State University. Health Commissioner, Mark McDonnell, stated that, "we are grateful and appreciative of Elaine's eleven years of service to the Board. She served as both Vice President and President of the Board and was a thoughtful, compassionate representative for the Cedarville community. She is deeply missed by the Board and GCCHD staff."

The Health Education Division provides a variety of health education and health promotion programs to the community. It is the goal of this Division to assist groups and individuals in making informed decisions regarding personal, family and community health needs.

HIV/AIDS Testing, Counseling & Education



This comprehensive health education/risk reduction program offers HIV/AIDS prevention services to Greene, Clinton and Fayette County residents with additional support services to Warren County at a total of 16 testing sites. The primary focus is to educate residents about the HIV virus and other Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs). Group education, individual counseling, testing and community outreach are provided.

Regular testing and education sites include the following community-based organizations: Women's Recovery Center, Central State University, Wilberforce University, Wright State University, Fayette County Health Department, Clinton County Health Department, TCN Behavioral Health Services, Fayette County Recovery Center, Fayette Alternative School, Wilmington College, Greene County Boys' and Girls' Treatment Centers, Greene County Learning Center and Greene County Independent Living. Additional education interventions include: National Black HIV/AIDS Awareness Day events, Greene County Alternative School, Greene County Health Fair, Ohio AIDS Coalition Healing Weekend, TAWAWA HIV Education Program for Clergy and Laypersons at Payne Theological Seminary and Freshman Orientation at local universities.

In 2010, 1,522 people were tested for HIV, 1,138 received group

education and over 10,000 residents received prevention and educational information. The GCCHD co-hosted the 15th Annual Rural HIV Collaborative Conference for over 210 health care, mental health and social service professionals at Wright State University in October.

Additionally, GCCHD partnered with Wright State University, Boonshoft School of Medicine's Substance Abuse Resources and Disability Services (SARDI) office and is collaborating on a five year federal contract from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMSHA) for HIV and substance abuse prevention programming for targeted university students.

Greene County Safe Communities Coalition

The Safe Communities grant continues to address unintentional injuries that are related to traffic crashes in Greene County. Each year, seat belt studies are completed in reference to the general public, high school and university students. In 2010, 77% of drivers and 80% of passengers were wearing their seat belts. The importance of seat belt usage is a message that we emphasize throughout the year.



Distracted driving continues to be a problem and a cause for many crashes in Greene County. Cell phone usage and texting are the leading distractions. Efforts continue to work with community groups and law enforcement agencies in an attempt to change local thoughts and behaviors regarding cell phone usage while driving.

Motorcycle usage appears to be increasing with the rising cost of fuel. All new riders must wear their helmets for one year. The Coordinator

shared information at various events and festivals throughout the year. A motorcycle safety instructor was featured during a day at the Greene County Fair.

There were nine fatal crashes in 2010 compared to 12 in 2009. Drinking while driving and not wearing a seat belt have been major contributing factors to the fatalities in Greene County. Additional contributing circumstances include following too closely, failure to control, improper lane change or driving off the road, failure to yield, driver inattention and severe winter weather.

The Greene County Safe Communities Coalition continues to work with Greene County jurisdictions and community members to promote safe practices when driving or riding in a vehicle. The Coalition meets bi-monthly and is open to anyone interested in traffic safety.

Drug-Free Healthy Communities Coalition

The Drug-Free Healthy Communities Coalition (DFHCC), formerly known as the Tobacco-Free Healthy Communities Coalition, was originally funded in 2002. In 2010, most tobacco prevention funding in Ohio was eliminated. The focus of the Coalition was broadened to include alcohol and other drugs. The Coalition represents 13 counties: Butler, Champaign, Clark, Clermont, Clinton, Fayette, Greene, Highland, Madison, Miami, Adams, Brown and Warren.

It was through the combined efforts of these counties that we were able to continue to address the following programs and needs: adult tobacco cessation, technical assistance to schools and worksites interested in working on 100% tobacco-free policies and Operation Storefront, a program designed to raise community awareness about tobacco product marketing and retail advertising.

The Ohio Quit Line is another resource promoted by the Coalition. The Ohio Tobacco QUIT LINE, 1-800-QUIT-NOW, is Ohio's FREE telephone



cessation service for Ohioans ready to quit using tobacco. It is a program funded by the Ohio Department of Health (ODH). The Ohio Tobacco QUIT LINE provides individualized counseling from trained, experienced cessation specialists. Several employers and health insurance providers also partner with ODH to cover nicotine replacement therapy (such as nicotine patches and gum) to eligible callers to the Ohio QUIT LINE. The DFHCC meets quarterly and is open to anyone interested in tobacco, alcohol and drug use prevention.

Radon Testing

The Radon Testing program continues to provide free radon test kits to the residents of Greene County. In 2010, GCCHD distributed over 1,500 free radon test kits to residents.

Greene County Healthy Lifestyles Coalition

The Greene County Healthy Lifestyles Coalition has been meeting since 2002 and is comprised of people committed to increasing health and wellness among Greene County residents. Projects for this Coalition include the Let's Run program (an after school program that trains middle school students to complete a 5K road race), family fitness challenges, the annual Spring Has Sprung Healthy Families 5K Run/Walk and development of a physical fitness activity guide for County residents. The meetings are bi-monthly and open to all interested persons.



Help Me Grow

In January 2010, GCCHD was awarded a grant to provide Help Me Grow (HMG) Service Coordination to families residing in Greene County who have children that have been referred due to suspected delays and/or disabilities and those with a medical diagnosis. The program is free to those who qualify for services.

HMG is Ohio's birth to age 3 system that provides state and federal funds to create, nourish and maintain a coordinated, community-based infrastructure. The goal is to promote multi-disciplinary, family-centered services and support for expectant parents, newborns, infants and toddlers and their families.



In 2010, 282 children were enrolled and eligible for services. These children and their families were served by five full-time service coordinators and one full-time clinical supervisor/service coordinator hired by GCCHD with funding received from the grant. Service coordination includes providing home or center-based visits, assessments, screenings and education including Individual Family Service Plans. Prior to age three, the service coordinator assists families to prepare for transition at age three to public preschool, head start, private preschool or other services.

✓ Certified birth certificates, from births that occurred anywhere in the State of Ohio since 1909 are now available at GCCHD. Up until now, certificates were only available for births that occurred in Greene County. Certified death certificates are only available at GCCHD for deaths that occurred in Greene County. The cost for a certified birth or death certificate is \$24.00.

✓ GCCHD has been Greene County's source for public health information and services for over 90 years.

The programs covered by this Division vary greatly and once again the Environmental staff has performed an excellent job in either maintaining the existing programs or increasing productivity within others.

Food Protection

Inspecting restaurants, grocery and convenience stores, mobile food units, vending machines and booths at festivals is important for protecting the public's health. Through operator education and the identification of potential problems, we are able to decrease the risk of food-borne illnesses and reduce food-related outbreaks. We remain diligent in educating food managers on proper food handling and sanitation issues to achieve compliance within their facilities. In 2010, GCCHD staff provided:

- 876 licenses for food operations, mobile food units and vending machines,
- 428 licenses for temporary food operations,
- 2,122 inspections,
- 342 follow-up inspections,
- 117 food complaint inspections,
- 3,621 consultations, and
- 40 in-service food training courses.

Institutional Facility Inspection Program

GCCHD staff performed 110 inspections in the 53 active school buildings in the County this year. The guidelines are set to reasonably ensure that school buildings provide a safe and sanitary environment where children can learn and develop.

There are three jails/detention centers in Greene County. These buildings are inspected upon request in accordance

with current Ohio Department of Correction's regulations. In 2010, we completed one consultation and one inspection of a jail to ensure appropriate living conditions, general sanitation and appropriate maintenance and upkeep.

Manufactured Home Parks

At manufactured home parks, we inspect for cleanliness, proper disposal of refuse, location and storage of recreational vehicles and boats and electrical, water and sewer connections. A training session for park operators was conducted in February 2010 in conjunction with the Fairborn and Greene County Building Departments. The meeting addressed the new mobile home placement inspection process per the revised Manufactured Home Park Regulation, which became effective January 1, 2010. In 2010, GCCHD staff provided:

- 13 manufactured home park licenses,
- 44 inspections, and
- Seven complaint and/or follow-up inspections.

Mosquito Control Program

All Greene County residents benefit from this program. Utilizing Integrated Pest Management techniques, staff investigates complaints and distributes educational information on mosquito control. We also work with the Ohio Department of Health (ODH) for the collection of adult mosquitoes for testing for West Nile Virus (WNV). Ninety-one pools of mosquitoes were tested for WNV in 2010. Ninety were negative and one was positive.

Household & Semi-Public Sewage Treatment Systems

The Division is responsible for enforcement of the Greene County Household and Small Flow Sewage Treatment System Regulations.

In 2010,

- 29 sites were evaluated for placement and design of an on-lot sewage treatment system,
- 49 existing lots were evaluated for malfunctioning systems,
- 40 new or replacement systems were installed, and
- 228 sites were inspected under the Operation and Maintenance Program.

Housing Program

The housing program is designed to address unsanitary conditions in houses and apartments within the County. A total of 20 complaints were received in 2010 and 16 have

been resolved. Housing complaints in the City of Fairborn, Beavercreek, Bellbrook and Xenia were referred to their respective jurisdictions since they maintain their own inspection program.

Nuisance Abatement & Demolition Program

The Ohio Revised Code requires that nuisances be investigated within each jurisdiction. During 2010, 32 nuisance complaints were investigated and the owner of each property was cited. Community Development Block Grant funds were used to demolish two vacant and severely damaged properties and to clean up two other properties.

Plumbing Division

This important program, often overlooked, enforces the Ohio Basic Plumbing Codes in both residential and commercial facilities. In 2010, 1,867 permits were issued which required 2,806 inspections and 310 reinspections.



Private Water Supply

Contaminated water poses a health risk to everyone. This program is designed to inspect and enforce regulations pertaining to private water systems that provide water to individuals when a community supply is not available. In 2010, GCCHD staff provided:

- 45 new private water system permits,
- Two new commercial private water system permits,
- 15 well alteration permits, and
- Seven well sealing permits.

In addition to installation inspections, the rules require that a bacteriological water sample be collected and a negative lab result obtained prior to approval. The Division, upon request, will collect water samples for real estate transactions. GCCHD staff was a part of the ODH water work group to provide revisions to the Ohio Private Water System Rules.

Rabies Control Program



People are exposed to rabies when they are bitten by an infected animal or come in contact with saliva from an infected animal.

All animal bites must be reported to GCCHD. In the case of bats or other wild animals, brain tissue is submitted to the ODH lab for rabies testing. In 2010, we performed:

- 221 animal bite/exposure investigations,
- 567 consultations,
- 154 inspections,
- 10 follow-up inspections,
- 61 sampling procedures.

In addition, 62 specimens were sent to the lab in which five bats tested positive, 55 other specimens tested negative and two were deemed non-testable.

Resident & Day Camps

There are five resident or day camps located within Greene County. Four camps were licensed and operational in 2010 while one camp decided to “rest”. We inspect camps for general cleanliness and sanitation of buildings, including

exterior camp surroundings. Camper density, sleeping and bathing areas, water supply and sewage treatment systems are all elements of the inspection.

Recreational Vehicle (RV) Camps & Combined Parks

We inspect RV camps for camping unit and water supply placement and sewage connections. The parks are also required to provide basic safety items within each camp, as well as monitor and control campers within the park. In 2010, GCCHD staff inspected and licensed six RV parks and seven temporary camps, for a total of:

- 21 inspections,
- 139 consultations, and
- Five follow-up inspections.

Swimming Pools & Spas

It is the responsibility of GCCHD to license and inspect all public pools and spas in Greene County. Inspections include verifying proper water chemistry along with safety and sanitation issues. In 2010, GCCHD staff provided:

- 31 licenses and inspections for indoor pools/spas,
- 80 licenses and inspections for outdoor pools/spas,
- One license and inspection for a bathing beach,
- 870 additional inspections,
- 65 follow-up inspections, and
- 595 consultations.

Refuse Transporter, Septage Transporter & Septage Disposal Program

This program regulates vehicles that transport trash, debris and liquid septage pumped from septic tanks or port-a-potties. In 2010, 166 trucks from nine companies were inspected. Staff also investigates complaints regarding the proper disposal and land application of septage. The actual enforcement for land application

is performed by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (US EPA) out of the Region Five office in Chicago, Illinois. GCCHD staff renewed four requests for sites for land applications of septage and inspected 20 vehicles that haul septage.

Solid Waste Program

This program’s title is deceiving because it handles the licensing and inspections for many programs. This includes the following facilities:

construction and demolition debris, solid waste transfer, compost and hazardous and infectious waste. The program also inspects closed landfills and responds to open dumping complaints.

Tattoos & Body Piercing

GCCHD staff was responsible for licensing and inspecting nine tattoo and body piercing studios in Greene County during 2010. Studios are inspected for:

- Sterilization of equipment and jewelry,
- Cleaning of body part(s) prior to the procedure,
- Documentation of dyes and jewelry,
- Overall studio sanitation, and
- Verification that artists are appropriately trained in bloodborne pathogens, first aid and performing the tattoos and/or body piercings.

Emergency Preparedness

Whether it is a Heat Alert, a biological event like Anthrax or Pandemic Flu, or a natural disaster such as a tornado, GCCHD has written plans to address its community response. This program covers a variety of activities that enhance not only GCCHD’s emergency response, but also the response of many community partners.



The Community Health Services (CHS) Division provides health care services through clinics and programs for the community. CHS houses many public health professionals and support staff. Most programs are available by appointment. GCCHD accepts Medicaid, some private insurance and private pay including sliding fee scale payments for those who may be under- or uninsured.

A Healthier Me Program

“A Healthier Me” program was created to enhance the health and quality of life of Greene County children by promoting healthy lifestyle behaviors. The program offers expanded health education through fitness and nutrition activities throughout the communities of Greene County by presenting the program to groups such as the Girl Scouts and students from intermediate schools. A total of 245 youth participated in 2010.



The “A Healthier Me” program collaborates with other Greene County agencies to implement the program. These include Sports Medicine of Greene Memorial Hospital, area YMCAs, the Drug-Free Healthy Communities Coalition, Fairborn and Jamestown summer lunch programs, Greene County schools, Greene County Sheriff’s Department and Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) volunteers.

Bureau for Children with Medical Handicaps (BCMh) Program

BCMh is a tax-supported, state administered program of the Ohio Department of Health (ODH). BCMh links families of children with special health care needs to a network of quality providers and helps families obtain payment for some services their child needs. Special health care issues include those caused by a condition a child is born with or one that develops after birth.

The program is provided by two PHNs who are registered nurses skilled in assisting families of children with special needs. In 2010, a total of 330 children received BCMh home visits. Assistance is based on medical eligibility of Greene County children up to age 21 that are Ohio residents and who may be without health insurance or Medicaid.

Communicable Disease Control Program

The goals of this program are to control the incidence and spread of communicable disease through effective reporting, treatment and follow-up in Greene County and to provide best practice interventions related to current prevention and treatment of specific diseases. A communicable disease is one that can be transmitted from one person to another. Activities of this program include monitoring, tracking and investigating these diseases. The Communicable Disease PHN is responsible for reporting some diseases to ODH. In 2010, 1,125 communicable diseases were reported to GCCHD. A copy of the Quick Guide to Reportable Infectious Diseases in Ohio and the Varicella surveillance worksheet was sent to 223 Greene County physicians.

Dental Clinic

Lack of access to dental care remains the number one unmet health need in the Nation. GCCHD houses the only Safety Net dental clinic in Greene County. The goal of this program is to provide comprehensive dental care and dental health education to uninsured and underinsured residents. The dental clinic operates three days per week. In 2010, 1,389 clients were seen during 2,319



visits. Uninsured clients accounted for 42% of those visits.

The dental team provides dental services for children and adults. Services include:

- Exams & cleanings,
- X-rays,
- Fluoride treatment,
- Sealants & fillings, and
- Extractions.

Immunization Program

Immunizing children and adults against vaccine-preventable communicable diseases is the goal of this program. People who are under-immunized are often at risk for lost productivity, increased health care costs and potential loss of life. The immunization program includes childhood immunizations as well as those for adults (overseas travel, boosters and influenza).

The immunization clinic provided vaccine (non-flu) for 1,541 clients during 2,017 visits in 2010. Flu vaccine was given to 1,140 individuals, age six months to adults. There were 231 visits for overseas travel vaccines. The PHN provided specialized training for nine medical practices in the County. Clinics are provided in Fairborn, Beavercreek and Xenia, with a monthly evening clinic at GCCHD as well.



Reproductive Health Screening and Education Program

This clinic offers Sexually Transmitted Infection (STI) health services to Greene County residents age 13 and older. The program is designed to reduce and prevent the spread of STIs in Greene County through comprehensive health services and education. The program provides screening, treatment, education and referral. During 2010, 791 visits were provided for 119 clients.

Social Services

This program is provided by a Licensed Social Worker (LSW) who ensures that GCCHD clients will have basic needs for food, shelter and clothing met. The LSW assesses clients' psychosocial needs, links clients with community resources and facilitates access to medical coverage whenever possible. Social services are also available to community members who are seeking information or guidance in accessing community resources.

Tots-N-Teens (TNT) Clinic

The Tots-N-Teens Clinic provides comprehensive well child care (birth to age 19). In 2010, 140 children received services.

Visits may include comprehensive well child exams, developmental assessments, vision and hearing screenings, nutritional and social service assessments, immunizations and lab tests (iron and lead screenings). Older children may receive physicals in preparation for employment, camp and/or sports.

Tuberculosis (TB) Program

TB remains a threat in today's society due to international travel and a growing immigrant population. The emerging drug-resistant strains cause even more concern, because this type of infection is more difficult to treat, cure and prevent. The primary goals of the TB program are to control the incidence and spread of active TB in Greene County and eliminate it as a public health problem. The PHN provides direct patient care, education, surveillance and outreach to attain these goals. The PHN reported two cases of active TB in 2010. The PHN also assessed and treated three individuals with latent tuberculosis infection (those exposed to TB but not having the active disease and not contagious). The PHN works closely with ODH and an Infectious Disease Specialist affiliated with Wright State

University and Miami Valley Hospital to ensure adequate and appropriate care. In 2010, 452 Mantoux skin tests were performed.

Women, Infants & Children (WIC) Program

The WIC Program is a federally-funded public health nutrition program for prenatal, postpartum and breastfeeding women and infants and children up to the age of five. WIC provides nutrition assessment, counseling and education, breastfeeding education and support and supplemental nutritious foods to at-risk, low income residents. WIC is in its 34th year of helping to nourish and educate Greene County moms, babies and young children. WIC-authorized foods and infant formula have been specifically chosen because

they are good sources of protein, iron, calcium and Vitamins A and C. These nutrients have been scientifically proven to be lacking or needed in extra amounts in the diets of the WIC population.

In addition, the Greene County WIC program has been fortunate to be able to take part in a special breastfeeding peer helper project since December 2003. The purpose of the project is to hire current or former WIC participants who have successfully breastfed their own babies to provide breastfeeding promotion and support to WIC mothers and mothers-to-be. In 2010, 59.2% of WIC moms initiated breastfeeding.

WIC has a proven track record of improving pregnancy outcomes, reducing infant mortality and providing infants and children with a healthy start in life. This actually saves the government money by reducing Medicaid costs for clients enrolled in

the WIC program. The Greene County WIC program provided services to 2,576 participants in 2010.

Women's Health Services

The goals of this program are to promote and improve access to prenatal care, reduce the rate of pre-term births, improve access to family planning services, increase access to effective contraception and improve the conception and inter-conception health of women in Greene County. Pregnancy testing, pregnancy care, delivery, postpartum care and family planning services are provided by eight health care professionals including Keith Watson, MD, Katherine Lin, MD, and Scott Bembry, MD.

The program served 368 clients during 983 visits in 2010. The rate of pre-term and low birth weight births for women and babies in the program is below the rate for the rest of Greene County and the State. Healthy babies save the health care system thousands of dollars. This is another example of how GCCHD provides important, money-saving services.



Annual fundraisers and contributions from generous and caring donors enable the Greene Community Health Foundation to continue its mission of providing quality services to Greene County residents regardless of their ability to pay.

FUND BALANCE OR CARRYOVER

Fund balance or carryover balance as it applies to GCCHD does not represent "excess revenue" or "surplus cash" in the bank. Essentially, it represents a mix of revenues from all sources that were not expended after GCCHD closed its books. These unexpended revenue mix or carryover balances are comprised of the following: (1) grant revenues that may be refunded if unspent after the end of the grant period; (2) restricted revenue funds that cannot be utilized for other purposes; and (3) general health tax revenue funds that are partly used to subsidize other state-mandated public health core services, including indigent care services. By the end of the 2010 operating period, the fund balance was \$2,614,664 compared to \$2,318,414 in 2009.

Public Health is the science of protecting and improving the health of communities through education, promotion of healthy lifestyles and research for disease and injury prevention. Public health professionals analyze the effect on health of genetics, personal choice and the environment in order to develop programs that protect the health of families and communities.

Overall, public health is concerned with protecting the health of entire populations. These populations can be as small as a local neighborhood or as big as an entire country.

Public health professionals try to prevent problems from happening or recurring through implementing programs, developing policies, administering services and conducting research. It is also a field that is concerned with limiting health disparities while striving for health care equity, quality and accessibility.
